Short Description	
<p>The course will focus on practical and therapeutic uses of psychological understandings in the clinical setting. The course will briefly explore various forms of psychotherapy, from psychodynamic and humanistic to cognitive behavioral, and examine their effectiveness. In addition, it will touch on major therapeutic concepts and issues, such as the relationship between therapist and patient or working with dreams and sexual issues, as well as discuss ethical dilemmas that arise in the clinical setting. The course material will be illustrated by clinical examples.</p>
