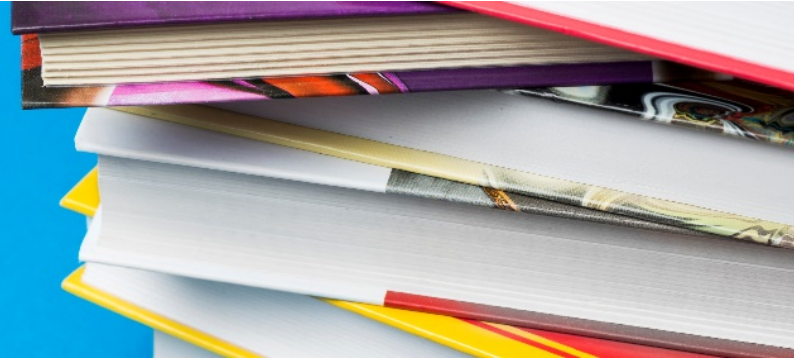

Short Description

The course will explore the science fiction genre in its dual capacity as both reflective and prophetic of the digital revolution. The course will examine the ways in which narratives of literature and film correspond to digital culture by reflecting the challenges that technology poses for the individual and society, such as digital monitoring and the race for human enhancement. Throughout the lessons, we will also examine the visual aspects of futuristic digital culture by discussing the aesthetics of humanoids and the ethical implications of digitation. Furthermore, the course will deal with the prophetic capacities of science fiction regarding the digital revolution, from the Victorian symbiosis of man and machine, the dependency on screens in early twentieth century literature, the imagery of virtual systems in 1980's cyberpunk and onto the dangers of virtual life at the turn of the twenty-first century.

Attendance is mandatory. Students are permitted a maximum of three absences without penalty. Any additional absences will affect the final grade and may result in failure of the course.

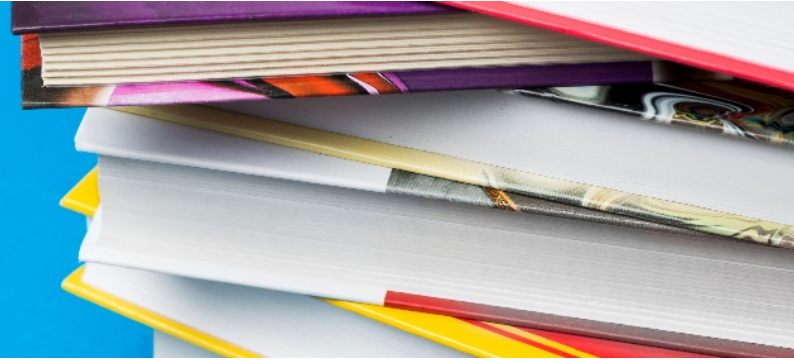
Academic Conduct
